Bespectfully represent, that they have acted upon sixty-six Bhils and have of that number ignored twenty-seven of them, of which the largest number are of a triffing nature, and ought not to have been returned to Court. We have found thirty-nine True Bills and nearly two-thirds of them are for selling liquor on the Sabbath day and to minors from those low groggeries. It does appear that the mojority of the keepers of those dens of iniquity have no regard for the sanctity of the Sabbath day, but will sell and inexicate men and boys who are swaggering along the pavements in drunkenness, to the great an-novance of the sober, moral and religious people going and returning from church, and, for pegoing and returning from carrier, and to be coming gain will wantonly sell strong drinks and intoxicate the boys in their minority, without reflecting that by so doing they are sowing the seed broad-cast of drunkenness, degradation and crime among our once promising boys, who soon must take the places of their fathers and control the destinys of our government. We do flatter ourselves that it will not be long hence

when the good and moral sense of the people will purge our towns of those nuisances.
