HELP YOURSELF. - Fight your own battles. Hoe your own row. Ask no favors of any one, and you'll succeed five thousand times better than one who is always besetching some one's influence or patronage. No one will ever help you as you can help yourself, because no one will ever be so heartily interested in your affairs. The first step will not be such a long one, perhaps; but, carving your own way up the mountain, you would each one lead to another, and stand firm in that while you chop still another out. Men who have made fortunes are not those who have had five thousand dollars given them to start with, but boys who have started fair with a well-earned dollar or two. Men who have acquired fame have never been thrust iuto popularity by pulls begged or paid for, or given in friendly spirit. They have outstretched their own hands, and touched the public heart. Men who win love do their own wooing, and I never knew a man to fail so signally as one who induced his affectionate grandmamma to speak a good word for him. Whether you work for fame or for love, for money or for anything else, work with your own hands, and heart, and brain. Say "I will," and some day you will conquer. Never let any man have it to say, "I have dragged you up." Too many friends sometimes burt a man more than none at all. As for women, this applies to them as well. A woman who fights her own way upward, al-ways succeeds. Begin by saying, "I'm as good as anybody, if not a leetle better," Don't say it aloud, but act it. You can teach a school, or start a manufactory, or a little shop, or paint or scribble, and live by it as well as the best man, if only you know your forte, and do not pitch upon the very thing you have no genius for. Shut up your troubles and your embarrassments in your own heart. Ask no man to help you because you are a woman-ull the same good men will, out of the kindness of their hearts-and such aid, unasked for, can harm no one; and your first success, achieved by your own hands, will be so sweet that you shall hardly have words in which to speak it. Ask help of Heaven and often—you will be heard; but of man as seldom as you can. I never saw the words, "She helped berself," woman's tombstone by way of enlogy. But I should like to have it truthfully engraven upon mine at least. I should like to deserve it.

COST OF BUTTER .- The question "what is the cost of making butter per pound for one year?" was thus answered to the Solebury, Bucks County Farmer's Club, by J. B. Simpson. He knew of no better way of getting at this difficult question than by taking his own dairy as a guide. In his dairy of ten cows last season the average number of pounds of butter made was 120. He therefore gave each cow credit for 120 lbs of butter, at 35 cts. per lb.........\$42.00 500 qrts., sour milk, at 1 cent per quart (equal to 48 lbs. of butter at 35 cts.).....15.00

2 months, or eight weeks rough winter keep, at 75 cents per week \$6.00 4 months, or 12) days feed, at 15 cts. pr 18.00

Taking care of milk 5.00

Making 163 lbs. of butter cost 844, or 27 cents per pound. In this estimate the hay is considered to balance the manure. The profit on the butter is \$13, to which must be added the calf in order to obtain the pro-fit on (ach cow. Will am C. Blackfan stated that he had seen the question answered in and old number of the agricultural re-ports, when butter was solding at 125 cen's per pound, that the cost of making it was 61 cents per lb. He therefore desired to know what it cost to make butter now, and had handed in the question for assignment. His own experience agreed with the swer given-viz: 27 cents per pound. Eastburn Reader thought the estimate too low; he had been making a rough estimate and found that in winter it cost 40 cents, and in summer 20 cents, making an average for WATCHES, JEWELRY, the year of 30 cents per pound. There is no class of persons in the community who are groping in the dark more than farmers ; ask how much it costs to raise a bushel of corn, or make a pound of butter, and not one in a hundred can tell; ask him which crop pays the best, or what branch of his avocation is most remunerative, and how few can answer intelligently. This should not be. - Intelligencer.

Recipes, &c

CHICKEN PIE. - Take four or five chickens (they should be young), joint them and boil for an hour in water well salted. Boil the heart, gizzard, and fiver also. Line a large sized milk-pan with the best pie pastry you know how to make; then put the chickens in layers, with crumbs of butter scattered over each layer of chicken. Fill the pan until it is high and rounded to the centre. Pour over all the liquor in which the chicken was boiled until the pan will hold no more. Salt and pepper should be sprinkled over each layer, and a little flour dredged in if liked. Cover all with a light crust, half an inch at least in thickness. Make an opening in the top by cutting a slit in the crust, or by taking portion of it, after which trim the edge of the pan and the opening with pastry Should the pie bake too fast, cover it with paper. Bake four or five hours.

POTATO POULTICE.-It is not generally known how much pleasanter and more agreeable, as well as efficacious, is a poultice made of potatoes than one made of bread. It keeps longer, can be reheated several times, and does not wet the clothing. Peel, boil and mash the potatoes; inin a muslin bag, and apply to the affected part. To boil them in hot water has a very soothing effect, and enhances their virtue. A poultice made of boiled beans is by some thought to be better than potatoes; but both are worthy of a trial.

BAKING CAKE. - Here is a simple way of preventing cake from sticking to the tins in which it is baked. Grease the tips tho-roughly, then put in a handful of flour, shake it all over the inside of the dish in which you bake; then, after turning it upside down, strike it on the edge of your floor bowl; that will free all that does not adhere to the grease. Now put in the dough and your cake will "come out" nicely. Dem Abhertisements.
