TO CRYSTALIZE FLOWERS,---Construct some baskets of fancy form with pliable copper wire and wrap them with wire gauze. Into these tie to the bottoms vio-lets, ferns, geranium leaves—in fact, any flowers except full-blown roses-and sink them into a solution of alum, of one pound to a gallon of water, after the solution has cooled. The colors will then be preserved in their original beauty, and the crystalized alum will hold faster than when from a hot solution. When you have a light covering of crystals that completely covers the articles remove the basket carefully, and allow to drip for 12 hours. These baskets make a beautiful parlor ornament, and for

a long time preserve the freshness of the flowers .- Journal of Chemistry.

Drop into well-buttered tea-cups half a tablespoonful of the batter, and set into each cup an apple pared, quartered and cored, with the quarters put together again. Now cover the apples with batter, and set the teacups into a steamer over boiling water. Steam one hour. Eat with sweetened cream.

pint of molasses, one teacunful of butter half a teacupful hot water, one teaspoonful soda, half a tenspoonful pulverized alum dissolved in hot water, two tablespoonfuls ginger; the whole mixed thoroughly with enough of flour to roll out and cut into cards. Bake at once in a quick oven.

COOKIES .- One teacupful of butter, one of thick cream, two of sugar, one coffee-cup of milk, one tenspoonful of soda, two of cream of tartar, half a nutmeg, and flour to knead soft. Bake in a quick-oven.

GINGER SNAPS .- One tablespoonful of ginger, one of lard, one tenspoonful of sala-ratus, half a pint of molasses, half a teacupful of water, with sufficient flour to knead soft. Roll thin and bake in a quick oven.

BREAKFAST ROLLS. - Pour sufficient quantity of boiling water on one pint cornmeal to make a thick gruel; then let it stand till nearly cold ; then add salt and one large spoonful of yeast ; mix in wheat flour until it is still dough ; knead it well, and then let it stand in a warm place for seven or eight hours to rise; when light make it into rolls, and bake one hour.

FLY DESTROYER .- Beat up the yolk of an egg with a table spoonful each of molas-ses and finely ground pepper ; set about in shallow plates every two or three days in a week, and the flies will be rapidly destroy-

TO PREVENT STOVES FROM RUSTING. -Oil them with sweet oil. This does not make a bad smell when the stoves are heated again. The stoves should be very clean when the oil is applied. Coal-scuttles may be oiled with boiled linseed oil.

CHICKEN JELLY. - For chicken jelly, take a large chicken, cut it up into small pieces, bruise the bones, and put the whole into a stone jar, with a cover that will make it water-tight. Set the jar in a large kettle of boiling water, and keep it boiling for three hours. Then strain off the liquid, and season it slightly with salt, pepper, and mace, or with loaf sugar and temon juice, according to the taste of the person fc. whom it is intended. Return the frag-ments of the chicken to the jar, and set it again in a kettle of boiling water. You will find that you can collect nearly as much jelly by the second boiling. This jelly may be made of an old fowl.

TO MAKE COMMON HARD SOAP .- Put TO MAKE COMMON HARD SOAP.—Put into an iron kettle five pounds unslaked lime, five pounds soda and three gallons soft water; let it soak over night; in the morning pour off the water, then add three and one-half pounds grease, boil till thick, turn into a pan until cool, and then cut in here
