The following instructions from His Excel-lency Governor Geary explain the duties of as sessors, registers and election officers, in regar to all freedmen of this Commonwealth :

EXECUTIVE CHAMBER, HARRISBURG PA., August 18, 1873. To the Sheriff of the County of Northumberland WHEREAS, The Fifteenth Amendment of the Constitution of the United States as follows:

"Section 1. The right of the citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State, on account of race, color or previous condition of servitude.

"Sec. 2. The Congress shall have power to referre this article by appropriate legislation."
