The Judges are especially requested to be present for organization at the appoint-ed time, as the success of the exhibition lepends very much upon their promptness.
The Judges of animals will have regard

to the symmetry, early maturity, size and general qualities characteristic of the breeds which they judge. They will make due allowance for age, feeding and other circumstances on the character and condition of the animal. They will give en-couragement to overfed Animals, nor award Premiums for Bulls, Cows or Henfers, which shall appear to have been fattened for butchers; (except fat Cattle in Class 2) the object being to have superior animals of this description for Breeding:
