AT a regular meeting of the Farmer's and Horticultural Association, at Augusta Post-Office, Dec. 27th, the following officers were chosen for 1874: President, Joseph Emrick; Vice President, Geo. Keller; Secretary, Jacob R. Clark; Corresponding Secretary, Ed. Malick; Treasurer, Jno. H. Snyder; Steward, Elias Emrick.

JOSEPH EMRICK reported his experiment with Arnold's Hybrid Wheat; a moderate success. Jacob R. Clark, from 3 plants of White Schramm's Hybrid Wheat, raised a bushel per acre, on well prepared soil, obtained two bushels of excellent quality. The straw grew very strong, and stood up well. This variety of oats seems well adapted to this latitude.

Proceedings of Teachers' Institute.

Pursuant to announcement, the nineteenth annual session of the Teachers' Institute of Northumberland County, convened in the Hotel, in Shamokin, December 15, 1873.

The exercises were opened with singing by the Shamokin Glee Club, followed by a reading of the Scriptures being read, and prayer by Rev. A. C. Clark.

The President appointed R. T. Owen, Secretary, pro tem.

Nomination and election of officers being then in order, the following were nominated for President: R. T. Owen, W. H. Gilger, Elias Schneider, and G. W. Campbell.

A recess was then granted for ten minutes. After recess Mr. Owen occupied the floor on the subject of Reading, treating especially of Definitions. He was followed by Prof. Schneider, who made a few remarks.

Institute opened at 7 p. m. with singing by the Shamokin Glee Club.

Discussion of Compulsory Education was opened by Mr. Stephens, of Sunbury, followed by R. T. Owen, when it was closed until the morning session.

After music again by the Glee Club, the State Superintendent, Dr. J. P. Wickersham, was introduced, who spoke at length on the Common School System.

On the Nature of the Common Schools. He divided these topics into his subdivisions, speaking with enthusiasm and energy, and the attention of the audience was well drawn, so that he was often applauded with hearty cheer.

Resolved, That it is the sense of this Convention that Dr. S. P. Wickersham deserves our warmest thanks for his presence, and his able and interesting address.

The resolutions were adopted unanimously. The Institute then adjourned to meet at 9 a. m. Thursday morning.

THURSDAY MORNING.

Institute opened with singing by the Shamokin Glee Club, and a portion of the Scriptures being read by Mr. S. P. Fink.

Mr. Ross, of Selkirk, then engaged the attention of the Institute on the subject of "Elementary Arithmetic," which awakened quite an interest among the teachers.

The Glee Club again furnished music, after which Mr. Campbell moved to amend the resolutions offered by the Secretary, which after some spirited discussion on the matter, the motion was lost.

Resolved, That there are not to be any entertainments to which any admission fee will be charged, that the registration fee will be fixed at 50 cents, for each and every teacher, and every other person wishing to participate in the exercises.

The Secretary chose for his assistants Mr. Stephens, of Sunbury, and Geo. H. Black, of Dewar.

A recess was then granted for registration, when 62 teachers reported from 16 districts. The Institute being called to order, Professor Schneider of Sunbury, made the following remarks: "Sunbury County, a progress of American Independence."

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
