Under the new Constitution the office is abolished in such districts, as will be seen by referring to the last clause of the 5th section of Article 5, under the head of Judiciary, as follows: "The office of Associate Judge, not learned in the law, is abolished in counties forming separate districts; but the several associate judges in office, when this Constitution shall be adopted, shall serve for their unexpired terms.
