The manufacturer proposes to sell to whoever wants such goods "advantage and marked cards," which can be read from the back as well as from the faces, an adknows the cards reads his opponent's hand readily. Then this dealer obliges his patrons with cards cut peculiar shapes, by which any kind of a hand can be dealt. For example, the backs of these cards are marked to show the size in the right hand upper corner, and the suit in the left. A certain mark in the right hand upper corner shows the card to be a king, and a certain mark on the opposite corner shows it to be a spade. Which brings gambling down to a tolerable degree of certainty. But this dealer doesn't stop at cards. 
