The daty is maintained on raw wool in the interests of agriculturists, and reduces the tariff on manufactured wool to the detriment of those engaged in spinning and weaving. There is a general reduction in cotton goods.

It is claimed that the present tariff prohibitory on some things, and that the reduction of rates will increase importation and enlarge the revenue. Suppose the revenue does increase by this reduction. True it would, but in New York i is the merest nothing--it means starvation which is not even genteel. Why is it? live on it and save money, if he could get what he lives on at any decent price-but he don't. If potatoes are worth, we will say, \$1.00 a bushel, by the bushel, what do you suppose the laborer pays for them? He can't buy a bushel at once, for his little \$15 won't go far enough. He has to pay \$7 for rent of his rooms, which is nearly live and sleep, leaving him \$8 a week for food and clothing. This would answer it he could only buy his food in such quantities, and at such places as food can be procured at reasonable prices. But he cannot do this, for he has not money enough. A barrel of potatoes costs, we will say, \$3.50, -should he buy a barrel he would have nothing left for other articles of food. So he buys a half peck of potatoes, for which he oushel, instead of about a dollar. 
