At last the work of the Constitutional Convention has been completed, and two crowning follies added to the many that have gone before. It has been finally decided to hold a special election at which this instrument is to be submitted to a vote of the people on the third Tuesday of December, (mid winter), and that it shall be voted on as an entirety.

We confess that we are not much surprised at these two decisions, simply for the reason that this body as a whole, has, throughout its entire career, shown that it was controlled by pigs and pragmatists instead of the apparently few men of business and common sense, who found their way into it. It looks to us as if the Convention had a deliberate intent to have its work passed upon, only by the denizens of the cities and towns, and it is not to be expected that the voters in the rural districts, miles distant from the polling places, can be induced at the most inclement season of the year, when probably the highways will be almost impassable, to turn out to this election.

If the Convention had been laboring to devise the most effective method of disfranchising the voters in the country districts, it could not have arrived at a more simple and comprehensive plan, than it has done by fixing the election at the blackest and most inclement season of the year.

Again, if it had desired the rejection of the instrument, on which so much time and money has been expended, it could have devised no more effective plan than to compel the people to vote on it as a whole, thus allowing them no power to accept or reject portions of it, but compelling them to swallow the unmix'd with the good, or to reject the whole, because of the unsavory morsels incorporated in it.

We are not now passing judgment upon the instrument itself, so wondrously long in the getting and the "boring," for from the meagre information that has been vouchsafed the public, up to this date, no one, save the members of the Convention, can form any opinion of it as a whole, but we do most strenuously and unqualifiedly denounce the time and method of submitting it to the people for acceptance or rejection.

The effects of the panic are now being felt by the poorer classes in the cities and manufacturing districts. Although business confidence is being measurably restored, yet nearly every branch of productive energy is more or less paralyzed, and consequently retrenchment and the reduction of wages, and the hours of labor and the number of employees, is enforced upon the employers.

The reduction in labor has been very great, and will be much greater. Thousands of laborers, male and female, are out of employment, and the coming winter is looked to with dread and dismay.

Most of the large manufacturing of the country are running on half time, and working but two-thirds or one-half of their force, and every Saturday night additional numbers of workmen are discharged.

God help the poor! There is a frightful winter before them, unless general confidence is soon restored. There must inevitably be a great shrinkage in values, and a consequent reduction in wages, and the sooner both rich and poor make up their minds to this better, for until both employers and employes realize these facts, business will not resume its natural channels.

A Bellevue Lawyer Accidently Kills Himself.

LOCK HAVEN, Pa., Oct. 28.—George Younig died thirty-six, of the firm of Bush & Younig, lawyers in Bellevue, accidentally shot himself yesterday while out hunting near Three Runks, Clearfield county. After walking and riding in a wagon a distance of twelve miles he reached Sinnamoning, and was brought to this city on the train last night. He died about half past six o'clock this morning. He was the choice of the republicans of Centre county for Congress last fall, but at the district congress meeting gave way to the Hon. S. Ross.

A Desperate Negro.

CAIRO, Oct. 30.—The dead body of Mr. Miller was found in his cotton field near Fulton, Ky., yesterday. He was evidently murdered by a club which was found near the body. Joe Bradshaw, a negro, who was seen to enter the field in the forenoon, was suspected of the crime and was arrested today. He broke away from his captors while on his way to jail, and fled aboard the steamer Idlewild, and was drowned.

A Murder in Wyoming.

WILLIAMSVILLE, October 28.—John McLaughlin, aged thirty, was murdered yesterday while driving a team on the public road in Casper, Wyoming. He was found lying in the mud with his breast and throat horribly mangled by a gun shot wound. His cousin, James McLaughlin, started out from his house in the morning with a gun, and as he is missing it is supposed that he did the deed, as there had been ill feeling between them for some time. This is the fourth murder that has been committed in this county inside of six months.

Destructive Earthquake in Sicily.

ROME, Nov. 1.—A great earthquake has occurred in Sicily. The Trapalzo sulphur mine has been destroyed, and violent eruptions in Mount Etna have taken place, causing much devastation in the provinces of Catania and Taormina. The people are greatly alarmed. The river Tiber has overflowed its banks and laid a large tract of country under water. The Pantheon is partially submerged.

Blind Furnace Operatives.

PITTSBURGH, Oct. 30.—The blind furnace operatives of Moorhead & Co., on the Monongahela river, have suspended their strike. They were opposed to the closing up of the remainder of such furnaces in this city and in the Mahoning and Shenango valleys. There are eight of these furnaces, employing 10,000 men.

A Horse Killed by a Train.

ST. LOUIS, Oct. 32.—The dead body of a horse, named Thomas Box, was found hanging from the wires of the Virginian Central railway, Mo., on the morning of the 25th. There is no clue to the murderers.

Current Notes.

If the new Constitution is adopted, it will require at once ten millions of dollars to build a new Capitol at Harrisburg.

The gold coinage at the Philadelphia mint in October amounted to \$11,010,000 in double eagles, the gold weighed thirty-eight tons.
