

Col. ROSE B. BEATT, the present very worthy Surveyor General of the State, will, we learn, be a candidate for the new position of "Secretary of Internal Affairs," which, under the new Constitution, will be the title of the position now held by him.

There is now in Congress according to the official Directory just published, thirty representatives, officers and privates, and about as many more who held positions in its civil and judicial service.

A bill has been introduced into the State Senate looking to an appropriation—million of dollars we believe—for the centennial exhibition. Under the new Constitution no such appropriation can be legally made, and we are curious to see what ingenious dodge will be resorted to, to obtain this sum from the State treasury.

As a general rule we are opposed to duelling, but we will agree to waive our objections for the nonce, if the rumored hostile meeting between Hangman Foote and Jeff Davis can be brought about, and he made terminate fatally to both parties.

Apparently, the local opinion battle is to be fought over again in the present Legislature. A large number of petitions have been presented in the House, asking for a repeal of the present law, as adopted by a portion of the counties and towns of the State, and the enactment of a general and stringent license law uniform throughout the Commonwealth.

The buzzing of candidates has already commenced, and we have heard of at least half a score of gentlemen willing, yet anxious to serve the people in the next Legislature.

How, as it is not our funeral, and as candidates may be acting on the principle of enjoying themselves while they can, for soon the night cometh, we don't propose to file any special objections to their present activity.

Further down the island comes the Quaker city, marshalled under the banner of Reform by two politicians whose names are connected with nearly all the political and Legislative frauds perpetrated in the commonwealth for the last score of years.

Next is the Penitentiary, with its 900 cells, all full, and its distinguished guest, Boss Tweed, performing resignedly and quietly the menial duties of hospital orderly, but an American name is also named—New Win. M. Tweed, who ruled us all, who gave and who took away, whose statue was to decorate our public squares, brought up a felon on the very boat which had so often borne him and his retainers of the American Club as distinguished visitors to the island, tumbled into the bath-tub by a man who he had himself appointed, shaved, cropped, clothed in stripes and cast into a cell six feet by four! There is a funny side to this to everything else.

From the Auditors statement of the Receipts and Expenditures of the County, for the last year—published in this issue of our paper—the taxpayers will observe that there is an actual surplus in the Treasury of \$12,784,063 which, yet to be collected, gives the new Treasurer the snug little sum of \$15,725, 421, with which to commence official house-keeping.

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We have no quarrel with the Commissioners, they are individually clever gentlemen in their way, but we submit that this system of taxation and financing proves conclusively that they are not fit for the positions they now occupy, and we advise that the oppressed taxpayers petition the Court at its next session, to enjoin them from collecting the unnecessary and burdensome tax which they have just imposed.

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
