Judge Harding, of Luzerne county, recently delivered an opinion on the subject of taxation, in which he decided that parsonages belonging to churches or religious societies, as well as institutions of a denominational character, and not of purely public charity, are no longer exempt from taxation for country, road, city, borrough, poor and school purposes, nor can any legislative flat hereafter make them so. They should therefore, be returned, valued and assessed like other property throughout the Commonwealth.
