A Great Configuration. PATTERSON, N. J. Feb. 13.—A fire broke out about seven o'clock to-night in the millwright shop, a building forming a portion of the Rogers locomotive works, filled in the first and second stories with costly machinery for locomotive building, which cannot be replaced for less than \$125,000. The third story was used as a millwright shop. The fourth story was used for the storing of costly patterns, and models of locomotives now in use in all parts of the world. These were invaluable for the duplication of certain parts and the loss is estimated at 15,000. The building cost \$50,000. A blacksmith shop in the rear was also consumed. Loss about \$10,000. Total loss \$210,000. Insurance \$25,000.

The fire spread to the flax mills of Barbour Bros, which together with the dye house was totally consumed, as was \$10,000 worth of yarn, and in the former. The machinery had been removed to the new Barbour mill a few days ago. The loss on the Barbour mill and contents is estimated at \$35,000, fully insured. Many houses were on fire during the conflagration but no serious damage resulted. At least 100 families were thrown out of their homes. About 100 hands are thrown out at the Rogers' works and 30 at the dye house and a number at the Barbour mills. At 10:30 the fire was under control.

OLIVE HARPER'S LETTER. PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 13, 1879. DEAR HERALD—Philadelphia is dull, disagreeable and gloomy as far as the weather is concerned lately. The weather is not so bright and amusements of all kinds it is the gayest of the gay, and there is really an embargo of riches. There are balls in every direction, public and private, surprise parties and masquerades. The number of invitations is on the increase, as well as amateur concerts, but the greatest event of the season were the cotillion ball, and the young Mannerberg ball, both masquerades. Thousands of families of the city were there and the whole scene was most magnificent. The theaters are all running to full houses. The Broad street theater and North Broad street theater are both playing "His Majesty's Ship Pinfore" to crowded houses. Oliver Beecher was in the company of the weather lately I have not been there, but shall go soon. Miss Annie Priday, a beautiful young California girl plays the leading part, requiring great musical ability, which she possesses in a high degree. In fact she is a first class singer, and her rare gifts and beauty, as well as her wit and sprightliness make her second to none. She has recently been playing the part of Miss in the drama of that name which was taken from a story by Bret Harte. It is entirely California, and fresh and interesting and drew well when played here.

Not only balls and theaters are well attended but also lectures and every other entertainment possible to imagine. Lent will soon be here and the right virtuous Philadelphia are trying to get all their sinning done up, so that they can repeat at their leisure. Mayor Stockley has been trying to work himself into the best of grace by the community by making a sweep of the variety theaters.
