A STATEMENT Showing the aggregate amount of the Assessment and Valuation of the several Townships and Boroughs in Somerset County, Pennsylvania, for the biennial year 1880, in accordance with the Act of Assembly, passed the 15th day of May, 1841.

The undersigned County Commissioners of Somerset County, Pennsylvania, hereby give notice, that they will sit as a Board of Revision, at their office in Somerset, from the 23d to the 28th day of December, 1879, at which time and place they will determine whether any of the valuations of the Assessors have been made below a first rate, according to the meaning and intention of an Act of Assembly, passed the 15th day of May, 1841.
