



The total number of immigrants who landed in the United States during the month of September was nearly 895,000.

In this district the lie was coined, published and circulated that our candidate for Congress had voted against the bill granting arrears of pensions to soldiers, when his opponent (Gen. Coffroth), with the record in his possession, will know how base and unjustifiable was the falsehood.

Again, thousands of affidavits were sent throughout the district—purporting to be signed by one Jonas Conner, charging that General Campbell had declared to him that if elected he would stop the granting of pensions to soldiers, when in truth and in fact the affidavit of Conner on which the charge was based was a forgery, proven by the testimony of Conner himself and several unimpeachable witnesses, and yet well knowing the facts, Democrats in this town claiming to be respectable men, in collusion with Coffroth, persisted in circulating these lies after they knew them to be false.

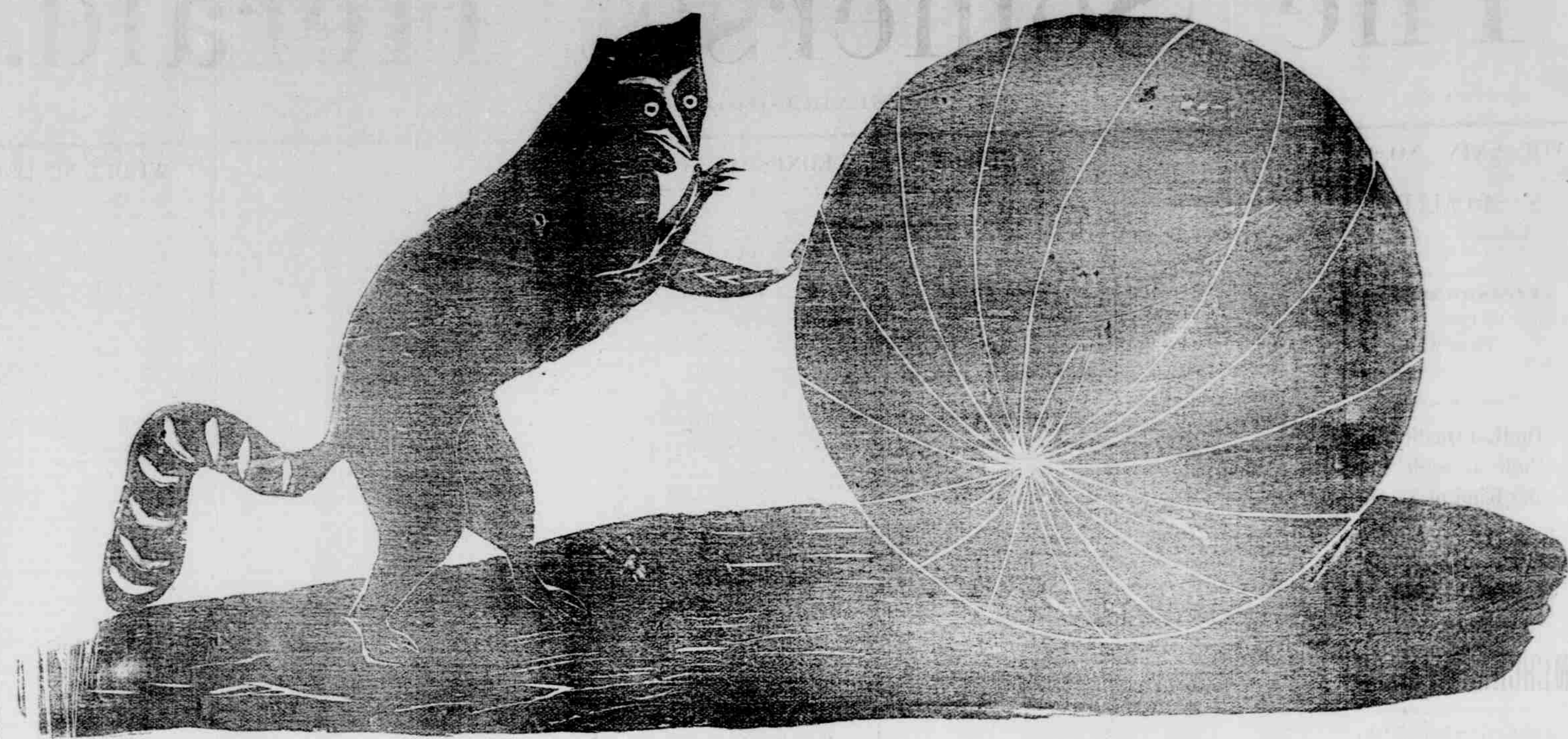
Nothing vile in all the vile annals of Democratic fraud and forgery was ever attempted to steal the votes of the people of this country and of this district.
