The following relative to the South Penn Railroad, is taken from the Chicago Enterprise: PHILADELPHIA, Pa., Dec 2.—A private dispatch received from New York yesterday says that the General Land Office conferred here in that city yesterday resulted in the conclusion of an important agreement between the Lake Shore, Lake Erie and Western, and the Southern Pennsylvania and Reading Companies, which was signed at Reading. Bonds were at once subscribed for building a new line from Harrisburg to Pittsburgh and Wheeling, which will be forty miles shorter than the Pennsylvania Road to Pittsburgh. The new road will have double steel track rails, and will save Vanderbilt a new direct route to Chicago. Negotiation is in progress for a lease of the Jersey Central Road as a part of the New York and Pennsylvania trunk line.
