



Ancient Music

The Egyptian flute was only a ow's horn with three or four holes in it, and their harp or lyre had only three strings and was very small, being held in one hand. The Jewish trumpets, that made the walls of Jericho fall, were only ram's horns ; their flute was the same as the Egyptian; they had no other instrumental music but percussion, of which the greatest boast was the lyre, with wire strings, and struck with an iron needle, or stick : their sackbut was something like a bagpipe, the timbrel was a tambourine and the dulcimer was a horizontal harp with wire strings and struck with a stick like the psaltry. They had no written music, and had scarcely a vowel in their language and yet, according to Josephus, they had two hundred thousand musicians playing at the dedication of Solomon's temple Thodore Tom-as would have died in the greatest agonies at such a concert.-The
