Mr. William B. Shaver last week purchased a lot of ground forty feet front on Main Cross Street and sixty-three feet deep, from Mr. Amos Knepper, on which he is erecting a large frame building to be used as a store.

A little daughter of Jacob Thomas, who has been dangerously ill with diphtheria, and whose death was reported, is recovering, and Dr. J. M. Louthier, the attending physician, pronounces her entirely out of danger.

A charming little daughter of L. C. Colborn, Esq., died from the effects of that dread disease, diphtheria, last Friday afternoon. Mr. Colborn's other children, who have been afflicted with the same disease, are slowly recovering.

MERCANTILE EXPRESS BREAK—After a number of unsuccessful attempts, the fire bugs, who have been keeping the good people of Mercantile in a constant state of terror for months past, last Thursday night succeeded in accomplishing their devilish purpose by reducing a number of the largest business houses of the town to ashes. The fire was kindled shortly after 12 o'clock Thursday morning, in Holtzgraber's butcher shop, and spread with marvellous rapidity to the adjoining buildings. Newcomer's oyster saloon and Kritzberg's residence and grocery, were soon in flames. Heffley's tailor shop was the next to go, and despite the most heroic efforts of the citizens, the conflagration extended to the Mammoth Block occupied by Hocking brothers and G. W. Gasman, and in an incredibly short time this immense building was a smoldering pile of ruins. Many of the buildings on the opposite side of Centre street, were charred and blackened, and the front windows broken in. Shortly after the fire was discovered Burgess Kimmell telegraphed to Cumberland for assistance, and a fire engine was dispatched at once from there over the Balto. and Ohio Railroad, but the fire was under control before it arrived. The loss is estimated at \$50,000, the greater portion of which is covered by insurance.
