The September report of the department of agriculture shows a better yield of spring wheat than was expected a month ago. The improvement is in the northern belt, Wisconsin, Minnesota and Dakora, In Nebruska there has been a decline, in lowa little change. The general average is \$4, an in-

Crop Report.

crease of four points. The average vield of the crop, so far as the results of threshing are reported, exceeds 11 bushels, and may reach 114 bushels per acre. Threshing of winter wheat in the Ohio valley gives a better return than was expected at harvest, and there is some improvement in Missouri and Kausas. In the Middle and Eastern States the percentages of July are not materially changed. In the South the harvest was disappointing and rain injured the product in the shock. The returns indicate an average yield of about 12½ pushels per acre. The en-tire wheat product will apparently exceed

Corn has declined from \$1, in August, to 70. In the States of principal preduction the status is as follows: Kentucky, from 87 in August to 60 in September: Ohio 88 to 80; Michigan 80 in both returns; Indiana, 90 to 92: Illinois declines from 77 to 72: Missouri, rom 75 to 62; Kansas 72 to 62; Nebraska, rom 76 to 68; lowa, 73 to 67. The loss rest of Indiana is caused by drought. In the South Atlantic States there has been improvement; on the gulf coast a slight improvement except in Taxas, where drought prospect with no further decline, is 10 per ent, worse than last year and indicates over


