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A TERRIBLE EARTHQUAKE

Repeated Shocks on the Northern Mediterranean Coast

Two Thousand Victims

An Appalling Loss of Life in Italian Cities—Three Hundred Persons Killed in the Town of Cervia

LONDON, Feb. 25.—Severe shock of earthquakes were felt on the northern shore of the Mediterranean about 6 o'clock this morning. At Nice houses cracked, walls fell, and in some cases fatal casualties were caused. The people fled in terror from their homes and fell upon their knees in the streets, praying for deliverance from sudden death.

The best session of the United States Senate will have before it for discussion three important measures. The first is a bill to amend the act of March 3, 1875, relating to the duties of the Secretary of the Interior.

It comes out in the debate on passing the Dependent Pension bill over the veto that the President had signed a petition in 1884 asking that a pension of \$8 per month be given to all honorably discharged soldiers. He signed this petition a few months before he was nominated for the Presidency.

Although the Dependent Pension bill failed to pass over the President's veto, it carried the Republican members in solid column in favor of the bill. The Pension Committee unanimously recommended its passage, and the House voted in favor of it.

The Legislature of West Virginia adjourned finally on Thursday last, with out electing a United States Senator. Hon. A. S. Hendon, a Democrat, was elected by the Legislature, but by reason of technical objections he was not qualified to take the oath.
