Symptoms of Cholera Infantum. The following taken from a late issue of

the Boston Journal of Health may be beneficial to some of our readers : Cholera infantum the most severe form infantile diarrhou, occurs in hot weather and is a discase of cities. Its name implies that it resembles Asiatic choicen. Like tha perittle disease it is sudden in its attack and runs a ravid, vinient course, yet other It may begin suddenly while the victim apparently in good health, and it may The earliest symptom which attracts the at tention of the mother, is the severe purging the discharges from the bowels being quent and watery. The matter expelled is at first near the color in health, but in ;

orless that they scarcely stain the disper In some cases they are greenish and in others they are yellow or brown or the liquid portion may be coloriess, but contain little flakes or masses of mucus tinged with these colors. When the discharges are colored yellow or brown, they have a peculiar and offensive odor described as musty; when colagreeable in the world. They do not, like oriess, they have usually scarcely any odor. The discharges in severe cases are very fre quent, they occur hourly, and even oftener Vomiting commences with the purging, or very soon after that sympton is manifested It is incessant; everything taken into the stomach is almost immediately rejected, when there is nothing to somit then violent retching, or what some mothers term "dry

heaving," occurs. The patient, if water is offered, will dmin the glass if allowed to do so and will cling to it fiercely if an attempt to remove it is made while a drop remains The tongue, at first moist and slightly coated, soon becomes dry, and the little one constantly protrudes and moves it about in evidence of the thirst from which it suffers. Early in the disease, fever runs very high in severe cases it subsides very rapidly. The marked; that is, the skin is not so very hot what quickened. Very soon after the purging and vomiting set in, the patient weakens rapidly; it is agreed that the emaciation and less of strength are more rapid than in any

other disease, excepting in true Asiatic cholera. As has in substance been said, within a few hours the infint, peliaps plump and rosy before, can scarcely be recognized; the face becomes pale and pinched, the eyes and cheeks sunken, and the evelids and lips prominently parted; the fat melts from the body, the museles grow flabby, the bones appear prominent, and the skin often greenish or ghastly in its hue, hangs in loose folds. Is the disease progresses unfavorably, the symptoms of collapse are generally manifes ted in from one to four days. Cholera infantum in the majority of cases runs a very moid course; in some fatal cases, however the appearance of grave symptoms is delayad beyond the period stated. An attack of cholera infanture is easily recognized. In
