Philadelphia any citizen could procure a license upon payment of the license f-e to the county treasurer. In some counties licenses were granted by the court of quarter sessions when in the opinion of the court the public accommodation required them. The whole tion attending it shows that the unrestricted sale of liquors has for a long time been regarded as a great evil. It is one which statesnen and many earnest men and women have been wrestling with from the organization of the government. When, therefore, the legislature came to enact the law of 1887 they were seeking to cure and regulate this evil. This clearly appears from the title of the act It reads: "An act to restrain and regulate the sale of vinous and spirituous, malt or rewed liquors or any mixture thereof." The mode of restraint adopted by the legislature was two-fold. One was to increase the price of the license, by which many saloons would be closed and others rendered more respectable: the other was to substitute the discretion of the court of quarter sessions for the mere ministerial duty of granting licenses. by county treasurers, as it had theretofore existed in Philadelphia and some other places. If the construction of the act contended for by the petitioner be the correct one, then the title of act should read: "An set to increase the sale of liquor and to derive revenue therefrom." In other words, it would give every man in the state the right to sell liquor who could pay for his license

and comply with the act. This would do violence to its letter ami spirit.
