Declared Unconstitutional.

HARRISHUG, PA., June 8 .- Judge Simon n to-day gave a verbal opinion to the effect that the act of June, 1885, relating to the election of county Tax Collectors outside of cities, is unconstitutional. A collector elected last spring presented his bond and its appear ance was opposed by County Solicitor Ott, of Dauphin, on the ground that the act making Tax Collectors elective, was a special law especting the affairs of counties and therefore unconstitutional, because it limited the operation of the general law, which existed before its passage, so far as the collection of

county taxes is concerned. Taking this view of it the Court refused to affirm the bond. The act was thrice affirmed as constitutional, but on points differing from the one mised in this case.


