

THE LEGISLATURE ADJOURNS.

A Review of the Work Accomplished.

It is now May 8.—The 1868 Pennsylvania Legislature adjourned to day after an all-night session both branches sitting on the State Appropriation bill, which was finally sent to the Governor. The deadlock in the Conference Committee on the bill was broken this morning, shortly before 2 o'clock, by an agreement of the Senators to strike out the items of \$3,000 to buy the painting of the battle of Lake Erie, and \$5,000 to buy from Thomas R. Coeheran the copy-right of Smith's Legislative Hand-book.

The Chief Reason for the adjournment was:

A portion of the Legislature shows that over 400 bills have been sent to the Governor, and he has signed a number of them, but the most important not yet signed are: The act for the government of cities of the third class; the bill providing for a soldiers' orphan school; the bill appropriating \$300,000 for Philadelphia harbor improvements; the bill incorporating Young Men's Christian Association; the general revenue bill, and the judges salary bill.

Among the more important of those signed by him up to 5 o'clock this evening are the following:

Promulgating the unlawful moe-wearing of judges, etc., of the Grand Army, Loyalty League and Union Veteran League; prescribing the time and manner of submitting the prohibitory and suffrage constitutional amendments to the people; repealing the fence law of the year 1790; defining the rights of bicyclists and tricyclists and regulating the use of the machines; making the first Monday of September in each year a legal holiday, "Labor day"; providing for the removal and restoration of State bank charters; to prevent and prohibit the use of milk, cream, butter tubs and market boxes; prohibiting the sale of cigarettes to persons under the age of 16 years; permitting the building of sidewalks along the public highways and prohibiting riding or driving on the same; providing transportation to and from the dedication of the Pennsylvania monuments at Gettysburg, in September next, of Pennsylvania soldiers who participated in the battle, or whose names were then on the rolls of the regiments participating; prohibiting the printing or circulating of publications offering for sale, etc., counterfeit coin, etc.; dividing the cities of the State into three classes, and designating the mode of ascertaining and changing the classification.

THE GENERAL REVENUE BILL.

The general revenue bill is ready for the Governor, the report of the conference committee on it having been adopted in both houses. The important amendments incorporated by the Senate have been retained in the bill, and the Governor will no doubt sign it, although he does not approve the feature reducing the tax on gross premiums collected in this State by foreign insurance companies from three to two per cent, which will reduce the annual revenues from this source about \$100,000.

The small amendment made to the present law relating to the organization and incorporation of corporations. Another change from existing legislation provides that one-third of the revenues derived from tax on personal property be diverted into county treasuries which now receive none of this tax. The amendment of the House enabling persons and corporations to deduct from their tax on mortgages or judgments their interest bearing debt, does not find a place in the bill.

FAIRLY WELL DOWN.

It has always been possible for a Legislature to resist the temptation to do the wrong thing. This Legislature has done much better in that respect. It became right by sweeping away certain lobby influences, and it is now evident that the one or two attempts to work underhanded measures by lobby methods—such as the Penn farm job—met with deserved failure.

PERSONAL PREFERENCE.

The Republican State Senators, in caucus, selected Boies Penrose as their candidate for President pro tempore. The State Committee was selected as follows: Messrs. Royle, McLean, Parker, Woods and Leeson.

LOQUOR ON DECORATIONS DAY.

Mr. Craven on Tuesday moved that the vote by which the bill to prohibit the sale of liquor on December Day last be reconsidered, and this was done. The bill was passed finally. The vote resulted—yeas, 102; nays, 73—lacking just one of a constitutional majority and the bill failed.

THE JUDICIAL SALARY BILL PASSED.

The judicial salary bill adding \$1,000 to the yearly compensation of each Judge was passed in the House by a vote of 116 to 77. It is not certain that the Governor will sign it.

NO CIGARETTES.

The Governor has signed the bill prohibiting the sale of cigarettes to persons under 16 years of age.

A Missing Diver.

UNKNOWN, PA., May 8.—P. Y. Brooks, a well-known Bucks County diver, has been accustomed to make occasional trips to Fayette and Greene counties and the neighboring West Virginia counties to barge boats, etc. Jim Foyd, of Greene county, who testified in the McCandless murder trials to seeing one of the defendants shooting in the bushes with a revolver, his hand in it, watching for McCandless, is well acquainted with Brooks. The two often drove together. Mr. Foyd, in view of a letter from the sheriff of Greene county, D. J. Horner, asking him to keep an eye on Brooks, who is known to be in the West, Virginia, for a car load of logs. The wife is in great distress, and lingers to make inquiry after him. Mr. Foyd has seen or heard nothing of Brooks with this period, and it is feared he has suffered the fate of Dr. McCandless, as he was always carried large sums of money on his person whenever on these trips.

Frogs From the Clouds.

JAMSTOWN, May 8.—About six o'clock last night a peculiar circumstance occurred in a number of people. A dense cloud covered the sky, and they noticed when the sun rose, shortly after the clouds had disappeared, that the sky was covered with frogs. A number of dogs were promptly on hand and made it lively for the hoppers. It is claimed that a funnel shaped cloud, indicating a cyclone, was seen in the West shortly before, and the theory of some is that the frogs were caught up and carried in the air until it spent itself, which happened to be over the center of the principal business street.
