But, although he has this power, it will be our purpose to explain its character. The act in force in Allegheny county in May, 1887, in regard to wholesale license was the special act of April Scense to persons of good moral character and temperate habits upon the payment of the license fees to the treasurer. The act of May 24 contains no repealing clause, either directly or by the needful implication regarding the granting of wholesale license. The act is supplied by the others, declaring that the Court of Quarter Sessions shall

grant the wholesale license instead of the ounty treasurer.
