STATE TREASURER BOWEN begins his official work tomorrow. He is appointed ex-officio Treasurer of the State.

Fulton County Republicans will hold a convention on May 20th for the purpose of electing a delegate to the State Convention.

The Democrats of the Third Congressional District have nominated Hon. Richard Vanx as their candidate to succeed the late Samuel J. Randall.

Among the claims presented to the Congressional Committee are two from Somerset county—one for \$24,133.15 and one for \$138. They are among what are known as the border raid claims.

THE TARIFF FIGHT IS ON.

The Bill Now Under Consideration in the House. Washington, May 13.—Shortly after commencing the House, on motion of Mr. McKinley (Ohio), went into committee of the whole (Mr. Payson, of Illinois, in the chair) for the consideration of the tariff bill.

On motion of Mr. Mills (Texas), the committee granted to Mr. McKinley the privilege of speaking without limitation of the five minute rule, and a similar course was accorded Mr. Mills on motion of Mr. McKinley. Mr. McKinley then took the floor in support of the bill.

TEN OR MORE IDIOTS ROASTED.

Locked in Their Cells and Roasted Without Hope of Rescue. Moscow, N. Y., May 8.—A terrible fatality was the burning last night of the County Jail in this town, in which ten of the boldest inmates perished. This morning only two inmates remained as monuments of the destroyed building that had been occupied by pauper and insane patients. The fire started in the large hall occupied by Kesper, Manwaring and the idiots and spread over whom he had charge. So rapid was its progress that when discovered it was impossible to enter the apartment occupied by the female idiots, who perished.

There were twenty inmates in the jail in the main building. Some of the sleeping rooms were in the north end on the first floor. On the second story were the remaining sleeping rooms of the boarders. Mr. Manwaring and his wife were sleeping on the second floor in a bed room immediately over the office.

The insane department was in a separate building to the south of the almshouse and divided by a wall. In destruction it was as complete as that of the other. There were 45 inmates, and as soon as their keeper, William Hall, was acquainted with their peril, he opened the doors of the cells, allowing the inmates to enter the halls and thence escape. Four of five of them got away entirely. The others, with the paupers, were removed to the Methodist and Universalist churches at Preston Corners.
