Dependent Pension Bill. Washington, June 11.-The House this morning took up for consideration the conference report on the General Pension bill, The vote was 119 to 76, and the report will, of course, be agreed to. There is no telling how much money the bill will take, but it will be an enormous amount. The bill as it stands will give a pension of from \$6 to\$12 a month to every soldier or sailor of the late war who is now disabled through any cause or who may hereafter become disabled. An ex-soldier who has his leg cut off in a saw mill ten or twenty years from now will be entitled to a pension. The widows of all 46-inch, 76c., 85c. and \$1. 40 inch, soldiers whose marriage antodates the pay at 40, 50, and 60 cents. sage of this bill will be entitled to a pension of \$12 a month. There is no basis for an estimate of the cost of this bill, but from time to time nearly every man who ever

served in the army will become a pensioner. An Infant Glantess.
