People began to gather in the streets, and cursion boat with over 200 people on it was capsized in the middle of Lake Pepin. The boat proved to be the steamer Sea Wing which came down the lake from Diamond Bluff, a small place about 17 miles north of here, on an excursion to the encampment of the First Regiment, N. G. S. M., which is being held a mile below this city. The about 8 o'clock, and although there were signs of an approaching storm, it was not considered in any way serious and no danger was anticipated. The boat was crowded to to its fullest capacity, about 150 men, women and children from Red Wing and Diamond Bluff being on board, and about 50 people on a barge which was attached to the side of the steamer. When about opposite Lake City the boat began to feel the effects of the torm, but the officers kept on the way, while the storm increased as the boat continged up the lake and in 15 minutes was at its height. Nearing Central Point, about two miles above Lake City, the steamer was at the mercy of the waves, which were now washing over the boat, and all was confusion. The boat momentarily ran onto a bar and the barge was cut loose and the steamer again set adrift in the lake. A number of
