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George Hemminger, of this borough, showed on the other evening a copy of the Herald dated May 13, 1845. At that time the paper was published by Jonathan Row. It contains among other matter, a half-column article describing of "Break-neck Rock", which concludes as follows: "The place derives its name from a melancholy circumstance which occurred here some thirty years ago. A traveler on horseback, losing his way in the night time, as is supposed, was precipitated with his horse from the rock, and when first discovered, both lay senseless in the plain below, dreadfully mangled, and so much decayed as to leave no marks of identity. An inquest was held over the man's body, which was then interred on the spot where it lay. On the body were found \$15 in specie, chiefly in Spanish quarters, and near it a pair of chaffin-birds. From the circumstances it was inferred that the unfortunate individual had been either a physician or a vendor of medicine. In fact of this nature, he was interred to yet to be seen, and many of the horse-bones lie scattered around it. In a remarkable case of preservation, pointing out to the visitor the precise spot where the accident occurred."
