Important to Taxpayers. Below will be found a copy of a section of an act of assembly passed June 1st, 1889, front feet shod.

which every taxpayer in the county should read carefully for his own benefit: SECTION 13. That the taxes imposed upon personal property (money at interest) by the first section of this act, shall be collected by the several counties and cities, and on the first Monday of September shall pay unto the said state treasurer all such sum or sums then have been collected. the said state treasurer all such sum or sums of money as may then have been collected, and shall on the second Monday of Novem-ber immediately following in each year complete and psy unto the said state treas-urer the whole amount remaining unpaid; and in default thereof, it shall be the duty of the auditor general to add ten per centum penalty to each county or city on all taxes remaining unpaid on the second Monday of November of each year, which shall be charged in the duplicate against each delin-quent taxpayer in arrears on and after said day.

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
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
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
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
