Nov. 21 B. Scull, of Pittsburgh, is visiting in Somerset. ... Congressman Scull returned from Washington Friday, and left for Elizabeth Monday afternoon. ... Increase of pension has been granted Lewis S. Miller, of Somerset, and Thomas Cavatagli, Garrett. ... If you want to shake hands with the next Governor of Pennsylvania come to town Monday morning. ... The new township, created from the northern part of Somerset, has been named Lincoln by the court. ... George Ross is lying dangerously ill at the residence of his father—the Johnston House—in this borough. ... A. H. Coffey, Jr., of the Deceased, accompanied by his sister, Miss May, left this morning for an extended winter trip. ... Irvin M. Hoover, of Hooversville, has been drawn as a U. S. grand juror to serve at the district court, to be held at Pittsburgh this month. ... Mrs. Mary Barriman, formerly Miss Denner, and daughter of the late George Denner, of Hooversville, died at her home in Johnston on Friday last. ... It was five years last Wednesday since the marriage license law went into effect in this State, and in that time 1720 licenses have been issued in this county. ... Mr. Fred C. Kress, son of the late Fred W. Kress, of Johnston, passed a successful examination for admission to the Naval Academy at Annapolis last Wednesday. ... Dr. Robert Covode has sold his dental business in Altoona, and intends locating at Johnstown. He is at present teaching six weeks with his father at Jenner X. ... The grand jury at last term of court, recommended that the Court House be painted, and that the Poor House be heated with steam, both much needed improvements. ... Pending the acceptance of the new jail by the proper authorities, Sheriff McMillen has three or four prisoners confined in one of the jury rooms on the third floor of the court house. ... The indications are that there will be a large turnout of Republicans next Monday morning to see and hear Senator Delamater and the distinguished gentlemen who will accompany him. ... Mr. Albert McKinley left for New York City Monday morning. His wife and her mother, Mrs. A. J. Enshley, will follow later in the week. Mr. McKinley will return to Somerset about the holidays. ... John Bravley, for many years Superintendent of the Cambria Iron Company's mines in Blair and Cambria counties, died Wednesday last week at Hollidaysburg, of paralysis. He had been sheriff of Cambria county from 1849 to 1852. ... The court has appointed Frank Granger, of this borough, John S. Graves, of Meyersdale, and Charles Shook, of Stonycreek, all well-known contractors and builders, a committee to inspect the new county jail and report whether it has been built according to contract. ... F. J. Koser has added a pig pen to his park of educated pigs. The new addition was the manifested by a litter of piglets of streak of intelligence, but judging from the lines of his prematurely antiquated "pig" he promises to prove us delightful a squire as "Lew". ... James Hunter, Esq., son of Alexander Hunter, of this township and one of the county Poor Directors, died at his home near Erie, as an early hour Saturday morning. On Saturday afternoon on the train on the Somerset and Cambria branch road was a few miles above this city, a lady who was taken sick and her husband called for a doctor and was so unfortunate in throwing up some of the contents of her sick stomach as to lose her fall of artificial teeth. Whether she succeeded in finding them we did not learn, but hope so—somewhere tomorrow. ... "Optimism and the Great Prophet" was the subject of a very interesting discourse by C. W. Granger at the Christian Church Sunday morning. ... Mark 2:1-5.
