Comrade Miller was born in Somerset township, this county, on June 13, 1830 He was descended from Revolutionary stock. two grandfathers having held comissions in the Continental army under Washington. His grandfather Miller, was the first sheriff of Somerset county.

Comrade Miller enlisted on March 27, '62 in the 54th Pennsylvania Infantry. He received a gunshot wound in his left leg at the battle of Lynchburg, Va., on the 18th of June, 1864. He was discharged from the U. S. service on July 8, 1865.

His wounded leg had been a continual source of trouble to him since the war, remaining swollen almost double its natural size, and continually in a state of chronic ulceration, requiring daily attention and bandaces. There is no doubt but that the wound caused the sudden illness and death of comrade Miller. G. A. R.
