Following hard upon the Republican gains in the elections throughout the State of New York come those in Wisconsin and Michigan.

It may be hard on the people but the longer the present Congress remains in session the better for the Republicans. They are not a wise lot.

It won't be hard to entertain the National Democratic Convention which meets in Chicago in June. All that the Chicago crowd will have to do is to hold the coats and hats while the other felogies fight.

The Tazewell exclusion bill, which passed Congress will please Denis Kearney and his endotates. There is democracy in all things. Kicking fellow adherents of Tammany, led to a timely recall of the voters. In Michigan the ultra unscrupulous of the State officers elected by the Democrats, have been exposed and discredited by the Democratic majority in the Legislature have provoked a protest from the people. In Wisconsin the subservience of the Democratic leaders to alien priests and parishes has disgusted the German Lutherans, and has driven them back to their proper place in the Republican party, which is the party of civil and religious liberty.

History is repeating itself. Time and again the Democracy has achieved victory in off years by allying itself with new-fangled "isms" and with old fashioned and digested "dogies" but it never has failed to expand the fruits of victory with political camp followers and party juglers, just as the people disgusted and glad to return to the Republicans stand back and to fight under them in Presidential years. Wisconsin and Michigan may be counted as Republicans States in the coming campaign if there is much doubt as to the position of New York.

A REUNION plenary for the State Gobek and a Republican majority in the Legislature means that Rhode Island will continue to have a Republican Governor and that Senator Aldrich will return to the United States Senate. The Democracy made a great fust this year, but they are easy mark for the Republicans.

A Field For Missionaries.

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Blaine Will Not Accept.

If any answer had been needed to the sanguine story that Secretary Blaine was complaining that he had been betrayed and humiliated by friends of President Harrison into writing his celebrated letter declining to be a candidate for President, Mr. Blaine himself answered it Saturday in an interview.

"I see some of the newspapers continue to connect your name with the Presidency Secretary."

AN EXHIBITION OFFICE.

Prompty, as one answers a question upon which he has done deliberating, Mr. Blaine responded:

"The President's office is a most laborious and exacting one. He has no Vice, no alternative, no substitute upon whom shoulders we can share responsibility. There is a Vice President, but our scheme of government does not permit him to assume the powers and duties of the President, except in case of the death, removal, resignation or disability of the President. It does not contemplate the Vice President as an occasional acting President for a day or two, or a week or two, when the man who has been elected to that office may need rest and recreation, or a field for missionaries who are ready to take their lives in their hands."

LITTLE RHODY'S GREAT VICTORY.

REPUBLICANS get nearly Everything That They Wanted There.

PROVIDENCE, April 7.—Not until day-light this morning was the tedious comic of yesterday's ballot completed in the cities of Pawtucket and Newport and in a number of the larger rural districts. The Republican gains were maintained, and now none of the most sanguine Democrat was ready to admit that the party of protection had indeed lost a field of battle, but the field of a race for the State ticket had secured another, but any who fell behind were certain to be placed in office by a Legislature mainly Republican in both branches.

The Legislature has a Republican majority of 14 on a joint ballot, not counting the L'entenant Governor, who votes in the Senate. The Senate stands 23 Republicans to 10 Republicans in Delegates, in 'ye '92 '93 census. The complexion of the Legislature insures the return of Mr. Aldrich to the United States Senate.
