National Guard Ordered to Homestead, TO PRESERVE THE PEACE.

The Whole Division is Directed to Move.

HARRISBURG, July 10.—Governor Pattison at 10 o'clock to-night ordered the entire National Guard to move to the support of the Sheriff of Allegheny county in preserving peace at Homestead.

GOVERNOR PATTON will be maintained at Homestead without involving the aid of mechanics from abroad.

HISTORY OF THE TROUBLE. Highest of all in Leaving Power.—Latest U. S. Gov't Report.

The Causes Which Have Led up to the Present Conflict.

The conflict which began at Homestead last week was an interesting one. It is a fight for supremacy between the strongest organization of steel workers in the country on one side and the largest industrial steel manufacturer in the world on the other.

UPON ONE HAND is ranged the strength of the Amalgamated Association of Iron and Steel Workers of the United States, an organization having a membership of 150,000, and a bank of \$25,000,000, and hundreds of thousands more in reserve, and on the other the prestige, power and wealth of the Carnegie Steel Company (Limited), the new title of the associated interests of the Carnegie firm.

THE ACTUAL POINT of issue is the right of labor to dictate to capital the terms on which it will consent to be employed or to permit anybody to be employed. Obviously it is a struggle against a reduction in rates of 30 per cent. of steel workers, and an attempt on the part of the Carnegie Steel Company to make such working terms as it deems applicable to the present condition of the steel business, and the mechanical improvements effected in the process of manufacture.

THE CONDITION OF AFFAIRS has arisen out of the expiration of a three years sliding scale of wages in operation at the Homestead Works of the company, and the action of the company in substituting another with marked reductions in rates.

THE HOMESTEAD EMPLOYEES have been paid by the tonnage. Settlements during the last three years have been based on the selling price of steel, which was 35¢ per ton.

THE WORKMEN AND LABORERS entered herebefore from the railroad tracks and other points about Homestead of wood and iron, have been put up and bridged in their stead as a means of getting from one portion of the works to the other.

THE LATEST STATEMENT of the Carnegie Steel Company, Limited, the consolidation of the firms of Carnegie, Brothers & Co., Limited; Carnegie, Phlips & Co., Limited; Allegheny Bessemer Steel Company and the Keystone Bridge Company, is that the total assets of the company are \$35,000,000.
