Weimer and a jot owned by Elias Conningham, which said street and alley the said defendant is bound to keep in repair That in disregard of the defendant's duty of Main street was negligently suffered by defendant to be out of repair. That the plank forming the pavement were allowed to become warped, turned and twisted so that the ends of the plank were raised above the level of the pavement, forming an offset in the pavement, and said planks were allowed to decay, rot and become impaired, and a hole was suffered to exist in said plank.
