MURDER IS CHARGED.

Blubanghs Held for the Killing of Joseph Ankeny.

Deputy Coroner Owens went to Cook township, Wednesday, and held an inquest on the body of Joseph Ankeny, who died on Saturday, Sept. 1st, from a gunshot wound sustained during the progress of a quarrel with Ranhol Blubaugh and his wife, Mrs. Lydia Blu saugh, on the previous Thursday, August 30th. The testimony developed was substantially the same as the story of the
