orth in the following: "That it shall be the duty of the commissioners of each county to ascertain, triconially, with the assistance of the repective assessors, the exact number of axable citizens residing in each school district in their several counties, and to pay a fine of \$50 and to twenty days in tificate shall be prepared and transmitted on or before the first Monday of June 10. every third year, commencing with the first Monday of June, A. D. one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five."
