Secretaries of school boards are to be turnished with this enumeration, which will also be of sarvice to the factory inspectors. The secretaries will provide the different principals or teachers of the public schools with the names of children, their parents or guardians, in their respective districts. The parents or guardians of those absentees will be notified in writing of their non-compliance with the law, and if there be no reasonabie excuse for non-attendance they shall be prosecuted and fixed \$2 for the first of fense and \$5 for the second. Another provision is that this ast shall not apply to any child that has been or is being otherwise instructed in the common English branches of learning for a like
