Indications point to an almost complete failure of the Florida orange crop this year. A local fruit dealer says the Florida crop will not be over 100,000 boxes, whereas an average crop is in the neighborhood of 5,000,000 boxes.

The cause of the small yield was the frost last January, which killed many fruit trees of all kinds throughout Florida. The scarcity of oranges will cause a emporary rise in the price until the crops rom other sections arrive in the market. The Jamalca orange will arrive soon af ter the holidays. 
