An Ordinance

To prevent the running at large of cows and Be it orderned and quarted by the Town Council of the Borough of Somerset, Pa., and it is hereby ordained and enacted by

the authority of the same :-Any person or persons who shall permit and suffer any cow or other cattle to run at large within the Borough, shall pay a fine not exceeding one dollar, and it is hereby made the duty of the High Constable or Police officer to take and impound such animals when found running at large, and proceed to make public sale of them after giving four days notice by at least six advertisements posted in the most public places of the Borough, unless the owner or owners of such animals shall, previous to the sale, pay or tender to the the owner or owners of such animals shall, previous to the sale, pay or tender to the said officer the sum of one dollar for each animal so impounded, together with all costs and expense of keeping the same, and provided further, that when any such animal or animals shall be sold, the money received therefor, after payment of all costs and expenses, shall be paid into the Borough Treasury.
