RULES

BOARD OF HEALTH OF THE

Borough of Somerset, Somerset County, Penna.

 The Board shall be organized on the first Tuesday in February in each and every year by the election of a President and Secretary to serve for the ensuing year.

1. The Health Officer shall, in all business referred to him, and requiring legal proceedings, prosecute the same, but take such proceedings only in conjunction with the borough solicitor or his deputy.

2. He shall, whenever the Board directs a nuisance to be removed under his supervision, abstain from employing any person who is, or may be, under prosecution for any violation of the health laws. The same prohibition is hereby extended to any other agent of the Board to whom such duty may be assigned. a. He shall examine and report upon all

3. He shall examine and report upon all complaints of unisances placed in his hands within twenty-four hours thereafter.

4. He shall, whonever any missues may be found, immediately serve a notice upon the owner or agent of the premises, upon which such anisances exist, to abate such nuisance. In the eyent of the owner or agent not being found after diligent search, the notice shall be left upon the pramises and the fact reported and entered upon the record.

5. He shall, in making his returns, give an accurate description of the property or properties whereon the nuisance exists, together with the nature, character or cause of nuisance. sange
6. He shall strictly follow the schedule of time allowed in service of notices for the statement of nulsances, when not otherwise specified by resolution of the Board.

7. He shall, at the expiration of notice, examine said unisance and report what elon has been taken in the premises.

8. He shall with all returns of non-coolinace with notice, present an estimate the probable expense of removing said nearch.
