Metropolis. Aucient Petersburg, the capital of Adlison township, was visited by the most destructive fire in its history Sanday The greater portion of the population of the town was in attendance at divine services in the Methodist church when their worship was disturbed at 11 o'clock by ries of "Fire!" The audience rushed into the single street of the town without waiting for the formality of being disnissed by the parson and hastened to the east end of the village from whence huge clouds of dense black smoke were rising Flames were discovered issuing from the coof of the residence of William Stark. By the time the people reached the scene the fire had gained such headway that nothing could be done to save the buildng from destruction and an effort was made to carry the household furniture to a place of safety. Most of the furniture was saved.

A high north-west wind was blowing at the time and in a few minutes the flames had communicated with a twostory wagon maker's shop adjoining, in which 10,000 feet of high priced lumber, and other valuable material were stored. By this time the entire population of Petersburg, some four hundred souls, had collected at the scene of the fire carrying valer with buckets, etc., with which they made a feeble effort to conquer the flames. Moore, the well-known New Lexington merchant, and Frank Moore, special agent of the Department of Agriculture, who is charged with enforcing the pure food law passed by the last legislature, are members of the same family, but it is quite certain that C. B. does not propose to let Frank have a monopoly of bringing pros-

Moore was busily employed vaiting upon several lady customers last Wednesday afternoon, when a dapper ooking, smooth faced young fellow walked into his place of business and annonneed that he was representing the fifteen or twenty heads of cheese in a wagon at the door and confidingly informed Mr. Moore that they were the first made this season and consequently were better than any that will be made

The bill was accordingly made out in the name of the Somerset Creamery Company and was duly signed J. B. McCormick. Mr. Moore laid the receipt aside and went on about his business until one of his customers asked for cheese.
