For Another Penitentiary. Among the bills presented in the State Senate Thursday was one by Mr. Hagy, of Dauphin, to create a middle penitentiary district and provide for the erection of a building. The district is to be composed of the counties of Potter, Tioga, Bradford, Sullivan, Lycoming, Northumberland, Columbia, Montour, Fulton, Bedford, Cumberland, Franklin, Adams, Somerset, Blair, Cambria, Huntingdon, Union, Snyder, Dauphin, Lebanon, Perry, Juniata, Mifflin, Clearfield, Clinton, and Center. The institution must be capable of holding five hundred prisoners, and must be erected at or near Harrisburg. Seven Commissioners are to be appointed by the Governor to select a site of not more than ten acres, and have charge of the erection. This is an old custom which has So long since become useless as expensive. At present constables are required to go to the seat of the county in which they live on the first day of every term of quarter sessions court, and make a sworn return to the judges. In ninety-nine cases out of a hundred, Mr. Smith says, they swear they have no returns to make. Some judges have decided that there is no provision for the constables under the new fee bill, and they have to spend a day and the time in going to and returning from court without compensation.
