Evidence Going to Show That There was Perjary on Both Sides in the

Reddy Case. At a hearing held in Johnstown last Wednesday and Thursday for the purpose of taking testimony in the case of the Roddy brothers, convicted of the murder of David Berkey, to be used this week when their application for a new trial will be heard by Judge Longenecker, it was developed that the witness Herdman, who testified for the Commonwealth, was not the only witness who is alleged to have sworn falsely.
