Weeds and Soil Moisture -Seasonable Hints.

A single weed may apparently do but little harm, but every weed that ocsuples space during periods of dry weather takes the moisture from a large surrounding surface. One who has given the matter attention and experment estimates that one pound of weeds will remove 500 pounds of water from the soil during an ordinary drought, and that 500 pounds of weeds per acro are not an unusual sight on ame fields, the loss on each acre beng 250,000 pounds of moisture per acre, and this loss may be greater if he weeds are well advanced in growth. In addition to this deprivation of the soll of its moisture, weeds draw on the fertility and take from the crop the food which is so necessary for its ad-At least forty American lawyers are vancement and success.
