This is the narrative of a daring voyage of circumnaviga tion, undertaken by the author in 1895, in a forty foot sloop built by himself in Buzzard's Bay, and taken back and forth across the Atlantic, thence to Cape Horn and the Cape of Good Hope, without asdistance or companionship. The distance traversed was 46,000 miles, and the accuracy of the navigator's landfalls throughout was a thing to marvel at, his chronometer for most of the time being a little tin clock of the cheapest kind, Captain Slocum was a thoroughly seaoned sailor when he started on his adcenturous single-handed craise, but his unique achievement was not without diffiulties and perils that taxed to the utmost his strength, endurance and ingenuity.
