

Great Triumph in Jefferson County in a Popular Vote at Republican Primaries.

FLINN INSURGENTS ROUTED.

Conster and Suyder Line Up With the Stalwarts, and in Lancaster the Wisely Withdraw From the Field and Leave Regulars in Absolute and Undisputed Control.

Harrisburg, Feb. 27 -- Republicans of four counties, through their respective rganizations, last week went on record as standing by the stalwart leadership of the Republican party in this commonwealth. As this action is the first taken in the contest for the control of the next legislature, which will he called upon to elert a successor to Colonel Quay in the United States senate, the optrome must be regarded as ecially important at this time

The most pronounced stalwart vic-tory and one which has far reaching significance was that won in Jefferson county, where a clean cut contest was decided by a popular vote. It was not merely a half hearted support of the present Republican leadership nor a serfunctory indorsement of Colonel Quay, but a full, positive and emphatic declaration from the Republicans of the county that they are in favor of majority rule and have no sympathy with the nsurgent move
