—Hon. S. Newton Pettis, of Meadville, was in town on Saturday.

—A young deer was killed on Sunday last, near this place by some of our sportsmen. So we are informed.

—A ball will be held in Forest Hall on Friday evening of this week, McDermott's Band, of Franklin will furnish the music.

—The river, at present writing is filled with slush-ice, and the ferrying is rather bad. The rafting season will not be a success this year.

—Rev. Mr. Lowes preached in the Presbyterian church on Sabbath last, morning and evening to appreciative audiences. Services will be held a week from next Sabbath by Mr. Burton, and two weeks after by Rev. Mr. Virtue.

—This week we publish the corrected Time Tables of the Erie Railroad, and of the Allegheny Valley R. R. They will be found on the inside of the paper. Those on the outside had not been corrected, and the outside had been struck off before we noticed the error.

—Stephenson's well on Posey Field, Ross Run is to be put down 90 or 100 feet further. He struck a "stray third" last week, and began to test, but found no oil. He is now going down to the regular third sand, and we have no doubt that he will get a good well.

—The Borough Schools closed on Wednesday last on the account of sickness among the children. A majority of the children attending school had the whooping cough, and numbers of them had to be kept at home a great deal of the time. The school will commence again the first week in January.

—L. H. Simpson & Co., of President have about 9000 acres of oil territory to dispose of, which they propose to sell in plots of 50 acres to actual operators. Two or three wells are now going down on the property, with good indications. We were shown some of the sand rock from one of the wells going down, which old oil operators pronounce as good as can be found anywhere. M. and 1:55 P. M. Leaving Oil City at 9:15 A. M. and 4:15 P. M. This is a great importance to the traveling public and we doubt not their enterprise will be well rewarded.

—The wrestling match between J. H. McLaughlin, of Titusville, and J. J. Benjamin, of Washington, for \$500 a side and the champi-n belt of America, came off at Titusville on Tuesday evening of last week, resulting in a victory for McLaughlin. He throwing his opponent on the first and third rounds, and being himself thrown on the second.

—The Petroleum Record says, "there is a paper in circulation here to raise money to aid in the liberation of August Rhiel, who it will be remembered was sent to the Penitentiary for the murder of David Tate. It is said Rhiel is very low with the consumption, and cannot possibly survive but a short time longer. The wife of the unfortunate man is also in town making efforts to secure his release."

**GAS AT LAST.**—After many vexatious delays the Franklin Gas Company turned gas into the mains on Wednesday. The city lamp post burners were lit in the evening.
