what becomes of their money. We  
think it has been expended well.

—The woodchuck seems to have

and Sunday snow fell about here to  
the depth of six or eight inches. All  
are glad to see this, particularly the  
lumbermen.

being accumulated by some of our

of the fashion. Time!

—A petition can be seen and signed  
at Capt. Knox's store, to the effect that  
we pray our Legislature to pass a  
law leaving it to a popular vote to  
say who shall and who shall not have  
licenses to sell liquor.

—An extraordinary revival of re-  
ligion is now going on in the M. E.  
Church at Union, Erie county, of  
which Rev. A. J. Merchant is pastor.  
Large numbers have been received in-  
to the church as probationers.

—Capt. Clark, one of our Auditors,  
stepped in the other day and paid us  
two years in advance for the REPUB-  
LICAN. We enjoy that kind of business,  
and will welcome any one else that  
will act in the same manner.

—A social gathering was had at the  
Holmes House on Thursday evening  
last, which was rather an enjoyable  
affair. Parties were present from  
President, Petroleum Centre and Tidi-  
oute. A good time was had by all in  
attendance.

—A ball will be held in Forest Hall  
on the anniversary of the birth of  
Washington, Wednesday 22d inst., for  
the benefit of the Forest Brass Band.  
Good music will be in attendance, and  
we have no doubt but the Brass Band  
will reap a large benefit.

—The Good Templars' Lodge is  
flourishing here in spite of the many  
back-sets it has had. We make this  
statement that our neighboring lodges  
may know that we are doing something  
for the cause. The time of meeting  
is on Wednesday evening at 7 o'clock.

—A paper is in circulation to raise  
money to secure Presbyterian preach-  
ing regularly here. The paper is in

—Remember the church dedication  
next Sabbath. Don't make any other

tention for that day. We hope and  
expect to see a large number of per-  
sons from a distance here.

—We passed Ross Run the other  
day, and noticed that work was going on  
briskly. We had not time to stop, but  
understand that they are bound to get  
"Oil or China." We hear that three  
wells are to be put down soon, higher  
up on the hill. We wish the opera-  
tors and owners success.

—A Temple of Honor is being organ-  
ized in this place by some of our Tem-  
perance citizens. It will soon be in  
running order, and then we will have  
more recruits to help in the war  
against drunkenness and rowdiness.  
We believe it to be the Good Tem-  
plars' Hall for its place of meeting.

—Last week we accompanied N. P.  
Wheeler, Esq., to his Mills at Newtown,  
and had a very pleasant time. We  
found business brisk in that section,  
and lumber piling up for the summer's  
sawing, in a manner that was astonish-  
ing to us. The firm has about 2,500,  
000 feet of seasoned lumber to raft in  
the spring, and several hundred thou-  
sand and lath to pile on top of the rafts for  
ornamental purposes. At the mills  
at Newtown and Ross Run, Wheeler &  
Dusenbury have put in about 2,000,  
000 feet of logs this winter, and if the  
snow lays for six weeks, according to  
the ground-hog's prophecy they will  
put in half as many more. It is very  
refreshing to go out to our mills about  
here and see business rushed as they  
all rush it. We wish them all a good  
market in the spring.

—Xenia, Ohio, girls have a pleasant  
habit of kissing strangers in the street,  
and then wildly exclaiming "Oh, my!  
I thought it was cousin Charlie!"

This reminds us of an incident  
which once happened to us when we were  
on our way to the front, during the  
war. A girl, a real little darling,  
caught us by the arm, and gave us just  
about as close a call to an embrace as  
we have ever experienced. Unfortun-  
ately she discovered before she kissed  
us that we weren't her brother. She  
begged our pardon, and we granted it,  
but we shall always be sorry that she

—New wells are to be put down im-  
mediately on the Jamison Farm and  
the Sowers place. We believe Messrs.

—A meeting of the President and di-  
rectors of the above company was held  
in Sheffield on Friday last. It was re-  
solved to lift the charter at once, and  
an assessment on the stockholders was  
made to defray the expense. The di-  
rectors are sanguine of obtaining means  
to go on with the work next season.  
Confidence was expressed in the feasi-  
bility of the route. The large wilder-  
ness that will be made productive, the  
valuable timber and mineral resources  
which its completion will put into mar-  
ket, are certainly convincing reasons  
why the road should be built.—War-
