Mercury has been observed to indicate 70° during the last week, and in some places, we hear of it being as high as 84°. —There were two slides on the Railroad last, which delayed all trains, and passengers took the opportunity to see the sights of Tionesta. The track is now in good running order. —Mr. Miller, special Reporter of the Tionesta Herald favored us with a call on Wednesday of last week. Two other gentlemen, whose name escape us, were with him, and relieved the monotony of camp-life with cheerful conversation. —The Calico ball, which was to have come off some weeks ago, and was postponed, will take place this (Tuesday) evening. The Brass Band is to have the benefit of the sale of tickets, and those who dance can help along a good object by being present on this occasion. —A brand new locomotive, called the Jno. A. Dale, passed over the O. C. & A. R. Rone day last week, for the Pithole Valley Railroad. It was a model of strength and beauty. The Judge will not be ashamed to see his name displayed on so beautiful a piece of work. The Pithole Railroad will soon be in good trim. —Rafting business is as brisk as could be wished on the creek. We are informed that about twelve million feet of lumber will be run out of the Tionesta this season, of which the Cobb Mills will contribute about five millions, Wheeler, Dusenbury & Co., between two and three millions. As we write the weather seems favorable for a good run down the river. —An organ, of fine tone and appearance, has been put up in the Presbyterian Church of this place during the past week. It was purchased of J. C. Huff, whose advertisement appears in our paper.
